COVID REGULATIONS FOR OVFF 2023

Due to ongoing COVID-19 concerns, for 2023 we require proof of vaccination against COVID-19 from all attendees.

This includes children of all ages.

Proof of vaccination can be sent to <u>vaxproof@ovff.org</u> in the form of a digital photo of your COVID-19 vaccination card or provided at time of registration. If we have your proof of vaccination on record from a previous year, you are not required to provide it again.

Please note: You will not be admitted to the con without proof of vaccination prior to or at the time of registration.

MASK POLICY & SOCIAL DISTANCING

OVFF will require masks covering the nose and mouth in all convention spaces within the hotel. We recommend wearing a respiratorstyle mask (N95, KN95, KF94, FFP2, etc.) rather than a cloth mask, based on the best scientific evidence about current COVID-19 variants. Masks should not have exhalation valves.

The masking requirement applies in all circumstances EXCEPT when eating or drinking in the Consuite or at the Pegasus banquet, and when actively performing in a concert, workshop, or filk circle. Thank you for your help in making OVFF 2023 as safe as possible for everyone involved.

CLEAR AISLE SAFETY POLICY

Please make sure to leave all aisles and hallways clear of instrument cases and other clutter. Due to the increasing numbers of people using wheelchairs, scooters, and strollers, we need to maintain clear right-ofways. In the past, someone tripped over an instrument case, fell, and received a nasty gash, which required a trip to the emergency room. We'd like to avoid any similar incidents!

OVFF'S RECORDING POLICY

Individuals are welcome to make recordings for their own *private* use as long as the recording is unobtrusive and the performer's implied permission is given. Performers have the option of announcing, "Please don't record me" prior to their performance. In order to ensure that performers' wishes are respected, unattended recording is generally frowned upon unless previously arranged with OVFF.

OVFF's ROLLOVER POLICY

If you purchase a membership in advance to OVFF in any given year and then find that you are unable to attend due to an unexpected change of plans, OVFF will gladly consider rolling over the membership to next year's convention PROVIDED you inform us before the beginning of the con. We require notice in writing, (an old-fashioned letter or e-mail), not a phone call or a verbal message carried by a friend.

Memberships will be rolled over only one year. If you are still unable to attend the second year, we regret that we cannot roll it over again

LOST & FOUND

OVFF's lost & found department is located at the Gopher Table. Lost items found by OVFF staff can be claimed there. Items unclaimed at the end of the con will be held until next year. If still unclaimed, the items will be donated to charity.

OVFF'S ANTI-HARASSMENT POLICY

Harassment of any kind is not tolerated. If someone tells you "no" or asks you to leave them alone, your business with them is done.

Your right not to be harassed is not a right to not to be offended. All of us have different things that we find offensive. If you are offended, the best solution may be for you to walk away from the person who offends you. Should that person pursue you and continue to offend you, that could be harassment.

If you feel that you are being harassed, or if you notice someone behaving inappropriately (such as violating hotel or convention policies), we respectfully suggest the following:

1. If you feel comfortable doing so, point out the inappropriate behavior to the person(s) involved. Often this will solve the problem immediately.

2. If you do not feel comfortable talking with the person(s) involved, or if talking to them does not resolve the issue, please report the situation immediately to any OVFF Concom member. It would be extremely helpful if you could provide a name, badge name, and/or physical description of the person(s) involved. Please remember that we need to know about any incidents during the event in order to take action.

OVFF reserves the right to revoke the membership of anyone failing to conform to the letter and spirit of these policies, those of our hotel, and the laws of the City of Worthington and the State of Ohio.



- **Chamberfilk** Cat Faber will gather together all the orchestra instruments she can find and meld them into a cohesive unit in the course of three short days. If you are interested in performing with Chamberfilk, please contact Cat Faber Friday evening if you can or show up a little early for the first rehearsal Saturday. There will be two rehearsals, then a short concert on Sunday afternoon.
- **Pegasus Rehearsal -** Need a few minutes to warm up before your slot in the Pegasus Concert? Come see us at the programming table in the back of the main Concert Room and we'll unlock a door for a quick 15 minute session where you won't be disturbed.
- **Plan Your Own Event -** Need to hold a rehearsal? Want to hold a meeting? Host your own theme filk? Come see us at the programming table in the back of the main Concert Room to reserve a space in one of our open rooms at least 3 hours before you want to hold your event.
- **One Shots and Juried One Shots** Because of the limited number of slots and the number of people who want to have one of them, the slots will assigned by lottery. Entry slips are located on the hallway table opposite the doors to the main filk room. You may enter in both lotteries (One Shots and Juried One Shots), but if you are drawn in the lottery for Juried One Shots, you will not be drawn in the regular One Shots. Drawings this year will be closed around 10:00 the night before the scheduled one shot and winners posted on the main concert doors and Consuite doors at approximately one hour later. If you enter on Friday and are not selected for the Saturday One shots, you do not need to re-enter. You will remain in the Saturday night drawing for the Sunday One Shots.
- **Open Filk** (Any Open Room) Open filk may be started in any room at any time **provided there is no scheduled activity**. If an open filk isn't happening and you want to filk, grab a friend, sit down, and start filking. If you filk, they will join! Please note that Fairfield is unavailable for the entire weekend this year as another group is using it and has it set up for the next day even if it appears that no one is in there right now.

So this workshop will be a bit of both.As a predominately online/solo performer, I do a lot of improvise over-dubbed harmony lines to the songs I record. This workshop will be talking through the 'non-scary' principles of improvised harmony singing (as opposed to learning written harmonies in a choir). Caveat: I'm not an expert, and this workshop will be collective learning, so bring your own knowledge to share.No music theory knowledge required, just a love of Phil Ochs and a willingness to sing

This is a one hour block with only 4 slots, so each performer gets immediate feedback from our panel right after the performance. This happens before our Toastmaster kicks off the day, so audience should be minimal.
- 11:00'ish **Yoga** (German Village) Nothing energizes a sleep-deprived body like some yoga. Be sure to wear loose clothes and bring a mat; if you don't have a mat, bring a towel. Hosted by Dr. Mary Crowell
- 11:30'ish **Workshop- Cowriting and Collaboration** (Arena District) Creating new music with more than one person can be immensely rewarding... and also challenging. We'll talk about tools, techniques, do's and don'ts for creating music with a group, both in person and remotely, for both writing and music production. We'll also discuss the differences between cowriting and collaboration, and we'll talk about some common pitfalls and strengths of getting more than one brain involved in a creative process. 

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
Meet Our Guest of Honor Summer Russell

"For me, no matter the genre or the sound, the common threads are the stories we tell and the feelings we share." Summer Russell against a seemingly impossible set of odds; when she won back her good health and peace of mind through a surgical end to her endometriosis, it was a miracle managed

What is it about Summer?

I don't remember when we met, but I remember hearing her sing and thinking that she had an ephemeral calm and open eyed clarity that imbued every word with luminous meaning.

It's hard to see just one Summer, because she has a wonderful chame– leonic nature, her face shifts with costume and craft, so that she can embody anything, or fade into the back– ground when she wants



Learning her many forms was the gentle work of years, of slowly building associa– tions; of meeting different aspects of Summer, fighter, singer, lover, friend, through her Facebook essays, which were by turns heart– breaking and hilarious.

And we all saw her shift her shape and change the shadow of her story, campaigning



through sheer determination and aided by the support and love of her friends.

I didn't count myself as a friend yet. We hadn't had a moment of recognition. We're both busy people, and you can't make magic on demand.

Or maybe you can.

During the first phase of the pandemic, when Summer's face was in a tiny box on Zoom, among dozens of other boxes, I heard her do a Cry, Cry,

Cry cover and suddenly we had a common thread, and I messaged her, finally sure of what to talk about.

We learned each other in bits and pieces. Chats on zoom text, Facebook comments, and then in person at the first in-person filk cons.

But my first impression hasn't changed. Like all of us, Summer draws herself anew many times per day. I've seen her console a friend them to laugh, I've seen her singing protest songs she believed with her whole heart, and I've watched the smile build on her face as she watches people make connections with each other, or get up the courage to perform something difficult.

Summer's own performance style varies heavily, blending singer-songwriter and rock influences with Renaissance and Celtic musical styles, all filtered through a voice that's equally at home in classical music or campfire folk and roots. Her songwriting themes range all over the map, but each one has a burning core of reality, whether it's fantastical, or drawn from her wealth of memory and metaphor. Or both. Both is good.

I've also had a lot of joy watching Summer find her place in the filk community; welcoming and wise, and above all kind, it was a perfect fit.

She's been an enthusiastic participant in so many open circles, and embraced February Album Writing Month with her usual zeal. She credits FAWM, and filkers generally, with helping her to try new styles, and adding layers to her multi-facted musical tastes.

My mental picture of Summer is one that doesn't really exist. She's standing with a battered suitcase and an instrument case, covered in stickers from all the places she's been. She's dressed to travel, looking towards a new adventure, and a new chance to shift her shape. I see it in my mind's eye, and it makes me smile every time, because it's never the same twice.

We see you Summer, in all your fierce and gentle forms. Thank you for being part of this family.

Meet Our Toastmaster Lauren Oxford

I met Lauren Oxford, then Lauren Cox, at a startof-school party a music friend of ours threw for the local college LGBT group. I happened to start chatting with the nearest youngster over brownies and slices of rainbow layer cake, and it turned out that not only did she love music, she loved science fiction and fantasy—and cats as well, so I mentioned filk to her, thinking it might appeal. She thought it sounded wonderful and wanted to throw herself into it from the start, while I worried I might just have persuaded a

broke college student to take up an expensive hobby—but there was no holding Lauren back. She got her first real taste at the housefilk hosted that winter by Signe and Dave Wegener in Atlanta (an ideal low-cost, lowpressure venue to introduce a college student to filking) and as we tore ourselves away and walked out on the porch, she turned to me, her breath steaming in the midnight air, and said, "I'm going to GAFilk if it KILLS me."

It turned out there was no need for life-and-death striving; rides

and roommates were easily arranged, and Lauren won hearts everywhere she went, with her outgoing manner, her fondness for the oddest chords and tunings, and the intimate quality of her voice. Silky smooth and sweet, it can make songs by Joan Shelley or Kate Wolf uniquely her own, or slip her own lyrics—whether to original melodies or filks of show tunes—deep into the listener's heart. Lauren is also a music crosspollinator; riding with her has introduced me to Kate Wolf and Joan Shelley but also to Maiden Radio and Vienna Teng.

Lauren has a jack-of-all-trades approach to instruments and is always willing to learn another, the stranger the better; if she doesn't know any songs for it, she will write one. She has an entire closet full of instruments at this point. In sheer self defense we have come to an arrangement; when we have three or fewer people carpooling she may bring any instrument she can put into the car by herself. When we have four people, the requirements get, of necessity, a bit tighter, and she is down to three instruments, which will usually be whichever guitar she is currently romancing, her Peter Cox banjo, and her ukulele. Like many filkers, she is very much a night-owl, and can often be found filking and

talking till the wee hours of the morning with anyone with the stamina to keep up with her. In addition to playing solo, Lauren is also one fourth of singersongwriter "queertet" The Starlight Darlins, whom she has dragged along with her for their first filk convention ever.

Her songs range from the silly the trials of long-haired cats and litter boxes, inspired by her two fluffy cats: Henri (named after photographer Henri Cartier-Bresson) and Ansel, (named after photographer Ansel Adams)—to

the serious, songs of the love of her life, or missing her grandmother during the pandemic, or the losses and griefs that come to us all.

Lauren majored in photography in college and loves film photography as an art—the manipula– tions and effects that can be done with liquid and light in a darkroom. She grew up near Nashville, married last year, and currently lives in a small house surrounded by native pollinator-friendly plants in the mountains of East Tennessee, near Great Smoky Mountains National Park, with her wife Emma (a graphic designer and illustrator), and their three cats (for closure's sake, Emma's cat's name is Alli).

Meet Our Interfilk Guest Daniel Kelly

I'm writing this biography in the first person, as my introduction to the Filk music community has been entirely online, and I don't really know any of you beyond the Zoom window and other digital exchanges. The number of active Filkers in Australia (that I know about) can be counted on less than one hand, and while I have done a shared real-life concert with harpist Ann Poore and had one in-person chat with Robbie Matthews (and contributed to some of his songs on YouTube), we certainly aren't a close or active community. Not to mention the fact that Melbourne and Canberra are some 600 kilometres (400 miles) apart.

I have been performing as Daniel Kelly since I first started writing songs and putting them online back in 2011 (Daniel is my real name, but for various good reasons I perform with a stage last name, that also happens to belong to a famous Australian Bushranger, and also belongs to my wife). The Internet can be terrible, but it can also be amazing; over the course of the last 12 years I have had comments from experts in Gregorian chant asking who wrote my improvised plainsong version of the Hospitaler Knights anthem that I recorded while in Malta. I have sung at the annual Sydney commemoration for the thousands of orphan girls sent to Australia from Ireland in the 1850s, held for their descendants. I have also played at the Irish Embassy here in Canberra and spent a weekend performing for a history conference attended by the Irish Ambassador and his wife.In the online community I have met many passionate and talented songwriters, continuing the legacy of poet and singer activists like Phil Ochs, Pete Seeger, Alistair Hulett, Leonard Cohen and Australian John Dengate. I was introduced to British poet Cicely Fox Smith by a Sydney

shanty singing group and went on to set a whole album of her poems to music, and through that work meet a network of sea shanty lovers. If you look for them, the Internet is full of pockets of passionate welcoming communities.

I found the passionate and welcoming Filk community through a local Yass friend in 2017, when he sent me a link to 'Banned from Argo'. Prior to discovering Filk, my main musical interest was Irish rebel songs and other general folk music of Ireland and Scotland. I didn't quite understand the gravity of the situation when Leslie Fish commented on the absurd video I made with my kids to go with my cover of 'Band from Argo'.

"Snicker. I'm familiar with the 'folk process', but when my songs get filked, it's usually the words that get changed!"

Just in the last weeks Eli Goldberg sent me a recording of Leslie and Mary Frohman doing a concert for the Industrial Workers of the World in Chicago in 1974. Leslie had written her own unaccompanied ballad about the Irish war of independence. The body of work and contribution to Filk Leslie has made is staggering, and to share a Zoom circle with her a few times was truly an honour.

Since 2015, I have completed 21 albums of diverse material, ranging from Sea Shanties, to Child Ballads, many social justice songs, two albums of local Yass folklore and history and 3-4 dedicated Filk albums (four if you count the absurd cat-centred Christmas album).My most recent album, 'Tin Foil Cat', was written in three hours and recorded over six days. If you would like to see the scar on my finger that turned out to be the price of demanding so much from the I have sung since before I could remember, and grew up messing around on my fathers guitars and did formal piano lessons in my final three years of high-school. I've been in choirs as a Bass from high-school, through to university, and was also in a fabulously filk-themed choir at work for 10 years until COVID put a stop to it. Our repertoire included the Dr Who theme, many Lehrer and Coulton songs, a medley of 60s TV show themes and War of the Worlds choral mashup (which I attempted to do on my own on YouTube).

In terms of instruments, I play guitar, piano, harp, bouzouki, bodhran, ukulele, mandolin, a handmade Anglo-Saxon lyre and some violin (terribly). Hobbies outside of music include Open Source software development (I've heard Richard Stallman speak in person twice, and collaborated with him on my GNU/Linux song), manufacture of real and prop weapons, gardening, painting, writing poetry and learning Irish Gaelic.

I live in Yass, a rural town in Australia (about one hour north of the capital city, Canberra). By day I work as an engineer, and by night I record obscure folk ballads and some original songs in my bedroom studio. With five kids, and a recently completed doctorate in computer science, there is always a lot going on.

Special Guest Leslie Hudson

Once upon a time there was a baby born with feet first and eyes open. On day one in the world they began to take notes, according to their charge and birthright: Observe humanity, for you must pass as one of them though you are none; your life depends on it. The changeling child began to speak before others and sing even when it seemed no one was listening. But somewhere someone was listening. The dead came to listen, the fae, the unseen made visible to the child,

perching on windowsills and the edge of the bed. When the child was sent to their room for some misdeed, they found they had no desire to leave.

Creation came instinctively to the changeling child. Drawing, storytelling, the interplay of colour, harmony. They struggled with perspective and plot, but nailed the tiny details. The apple orchard scented the wind that blew through the window and, over the years, through all the lessons, beyond the practice, a songwriter emerged. They sat at the piano and wrote notes that stayed. They sat in the dark like their mother and learned to listen

to the sounds the piano made when their fingers touched the keys. They learned to feel their way across them, measuring distances between notes.

For the changeling teen, order fought chaos in their developing mind. Rarely at peace, there were days they forgot where they came from and why they were here. To learn, yes, but not to be lost. On the busy streets of a new city they tried to leave the shadow of their upbringing behind and dove headfirst into study and spirit. The songs came. Some spat themselves out, some cried, some soared. The first album came, then another. Years apart, but they came. Life and marriage and profession held sway, but underneath, always, the music flowed like the river beneath Fleet Street.

Then, breakthrough. New ideas, new partnerships, new calling. Stages and studios became the changeling adult's workplace. Eager to learn, they said yes to everything and everyone, learning at lightning speed. Not all of their lessons were musical, and there were casualties, but the

> changeling grew. They came to see that they lived a chrysalis life, with phases of dark dissolution and brilliant emergence. A life few would understand and some would resent, but a changeling must be what they are. The music comes, as it always has, from places of shadow and light. Ten years of this new life, with their eyes on the horizon, and there is so much yet to create.

Leslie Hudson (they/them) is a Canadian indie musician, recording artist, and award-winning songwriter. Their 13 albums range from storytelling styles to bluesy bar rock to dialed-up,

full-band homages to pop culture. With lyrical piano skills and a voice that cuts through the crowd, their songs dive deep into archetype and folklore, modernizing ancient voices & shining a spotlight on the shadowy paths we walk through life, myth and media. Leslie has embarked on multiple international tours, in Canada, the US, and Germany, guested at several cons, and collaborated with dozens of musicians around the world.

Cat Faber has written somewhere north of 200 songs in her life, many of them about science fiction, fantasy and other subjects near to filk fandom's collective heart. Known in particular for her lyrics, she also writes melodies and harmonies, and sings and plays the mandolin, as well as dabbling in some other instruments, most recently the violin. She lives in East Tennessee, with her husband, her three canoes, and her growing collection of instruments.

Clif Flynt has been filking since the 1970s. He's best known for being silly (Unreality Warp), ose (Ian the Grim), and irreverent (Preparation H+). But sometimes he tries to make music (Dreams, Geese).

Shirley Frantz I've been into Filk since my first con in 1975, when I heard Leslie Fish doing her Star Trek Filk. I've been to every single OVFF, my biggest claim to fame in Filk Fandom. I've been a fan of unicorns since 1978, and I like to collect unicorn songs.

Dick Green I've been attending science fiction conventions for over forty years and constantly sought out the filk circles. Three years ago I decided it was time to learn how to play the guitar. I've been teaching sailing for decades, was a professor in the WSU College of Engineering for several years, and have a passion to teach what I've learned in life. **Cat Greenberg** has been filking since she first discovered it in 1988 and knew she'd found her tribe. Her songs range from original stories, singa-longs and re-imagined fairy tales to political statements and history lessons. She's also Filk cochair of Archon and keeps the local House Filk email list. She hails from the St. Louis, MO area where she lives with four cats, a dog and youngest child, Aidan.

Daniel Gunderson has played in many bands and many styles over the years, and always enjoys a chance to back someone up on stage or in a circle. He's happiest with other musicians, in a circle, in a jam, or on stage. He is comfortable in a variety of styles, and if it has keys, strings, or if he can hit it, he can play it.

Emily Johnson-Erday is a member of the Starlight Darlins.

Sunnie Larsen has been a shining example of a performer from the tender young age of 3, when she discovered that her charm and her ability as a performer could move audiences. Since then, she's developed the skill to lift the hearts of her listeners by adeptly weaving deep emotional notes into the fabric of her musicianship.

Today, she regularly lends her talents to several bands, including Vixy and Tony, the "four-person filk duo" creating original and cover filk music; Bone Poets Orchestra, a psychedelic rock band; providing violin ambiance with fingerstyle guitarist Ronnda Cadle; and she's 1/3rd of improvisational string hat trick Ménage à Trio with Betsy Tinney and Alexander James Adams. She can also be found as guest fiddle and vocalist on a variety of filk and non-filk albums, further proving that she finds comfort and grace on the business end of a microphone.

Steve Macdonald A Michigan native who was transplanted to Germany, Steve Macdonald has been performing filk and folk since the early 80's. He has a bio as long as your arm, and if you corner him somewhere, he'll likely talk your ear off about it. Somehow, he became Chair of this year's OVFF. This may set new records for fannish telecommuting.

Kathy Mar has been singing since she was three, performing since she was sixteen, filking since she was twenty something, and writing songs through most of that. She's seventy-two and still going and would like to be Juanita Coulson when she grows up!

Cathy McManamon is a Chicago area musician with multiple Pegasus nominations for songwriting. She sings, plays acoustic guitar, percussion, wind instruments, and performs solo as well as with Random Fractions, Toyboat, Canticles Productions, and almost anyone else who asks.

Amy McNally has been playing the fiddle for over 35 years. She plays music full-time, so you may see her in one of her many musical configurations, teaching lessons, playing weddings, or at patreon.com/infamousfiddler. She enjoys pie, whiskey, and roller coasters, although probably not all at once.

Mikey Mason spent more than a decade as a full-time standup comedian. In 2011, he released She Don't Like Firefly which went viral on YouTube and got him featured on Nerdist online, SyFy, MTV Geek News, The Funny Music Project, DrDemento.com, and even Time magazine. Fourteen albums and seven EPs later, his lifelong love for fantasy, science fiction, cats, and games continues to inspire his music and help him evolve as person and artist. Today his profession is creating art and music with geeky themes. His performances are sharpened by long years of experience as a stand-up comedian. He's performed at theaters, bars, comedy clubs, casinos, colleges, festivals, and conventions

across the US, hosted podcasts, exhibited at art shows, created a coloring book, and more, continually expanding his horizons. His book, Confessions of a Geek Bard, was released in June 2023 through Falstaff Books.

Jen Midkiff has been part of the filk community since 2003 (when she learned that it existed, thanks to Barry and Sally Childs-Helton). Last year she had the very great honor of two Pegasus Awards, for Best Performer and Best Furry Friend Song. Perhaps best known for her work as part of filk band Wild Mercy, Jen has slowly been building a catalog of her own original songs. Thirteen of them are collected on her new album, along with her cover of the beloved classic filk song "I Am Stardust".

Judi Miller has been signing filk songs for us at OVFF for many years. She is a two-time winner of the Pegasus Award, and an inductee into the Filk Hall of Fame. Judi brings energy and enthusiasm to every performance she signs, and makes our experience visually as well as auditorily entertaining!

Robin Nakkula is a filker and fan and research scientist, who learned to play guitar in high school when the piano lessons her youngest sister was getting were switched to her middle sister instead of to her as requested. She since went on to realize that it was easier to to make science the day job and music the avocation, instead of the other way around (grants & funding is easier to acquire that way). Currently, her time is occupied mostly by the day job (cancer research, finally!) and husbandkeeping (Alan Dormire, fan since the 1970's).

Jason Neerenberg has been around filk circles for quite some time and plays bass with Random Fractions and Toyboat. He has recently been working on writing his own songs, some for his band and some for a future solo album, in between teaching high school math and practicing martial arts.

Mark Peters has been involved behind the scenes working the sound systems at OVFF for over 20 years. When he's not doing that, he enjoys going to other cons whenever he gets the chance.

Bill & Gretchen Roper have been filking together and separately for a very long time. By himself, Bill has a reputation for being grim, but together, Bill and Gretchen are usually very funny. They hope that still works post -pandemic.

Jo-Ann Scheffer is known as The Honorable Lady Siri Toivosdotter in the Society for Creative Anachronism. In her real life, she has taught Music from Pre-K to College and professional musicians for more than 35 years, mostly vocal music but she also plays Recorders, Keyboards and Drums. She is looking forward to her first OVFF.

Dave Stagner is a guitarist, songwriter and producer living in Minneapolis. His song Sublime was the 2018 OVFF songwriting contest winner, and This is How Elvis Died was nominated for a Logan Award for Best Original Comedy Song. He has produced numerous filk and filk-adjacent albums, most recently Beth Kinderman's Hero's Journey, and Astrisoni's Sounding with the Stars. He has been a member of numerous filk bands, including Beth Kinderman and the Player Characters, Gernsback Continuum, and the Feng Shui Ninjas. Oh, and he came up with the idea for the LOUD FILK!

Bill Sutton: The Suttons have been a fixture in the filk community since... well, for a while now. They have recorded several albums and are actively involved with the Interfilk Auction at OVFF every year. In addition, they are members of the Filk Hall of Fame and have won numerous Pegasus Awards- singly, together, and as members of other bands like Three Weird Sisters.

Brenda Sutton is half of the duo Bed n' Breakfast, one-third of the Irish trad trio Alair,

one-fourth of Three Weird Sisters, one-? of Dead Sexy, and appears this weekend as onefourth of a new band: Surreptitious Whiskey. She has won several Pegasus Awards, is a member emeritus of the Interfilk Board of Directors, a founding member of GAFILK, and the conchair for Chambanacon. Brenda is a prolific songwriter who, along with her husband Bill Sutton, teaches music and lyric writing workshops at conventions and the Biannual Slumberbardy. She also teaches the Irish language and the bodhrán for the Irish Arts Academy of Indianapolis. Her music appears on numerous albms, and she regularly backs up other performers.

Betsy Tinney is a professional cellist in the Pacific Northwest, known for her graceful musicality, her talent for improvisation, and her broad versatility. Highly sought after for studio recording and live accompaniment, she has performed with and recorded with many different groups, ranging from solo acoustic musicians to large rock bands. Her contributions to each are unique and are, as she explains, "whatever the song wants." Betsy's solo cello work, a tapestry of acoustic cello woven with an electric looper, has been called "captivating," "mesmerizing," and "a rich texture for the ear, reminiscent of dark chocolate and fine red wine." She has won several Pegasus Awards, including Best Performer. When not behind her cello, Betsy is a web designer/developer, visual artist and calligrapher, and part-time pixie. Gerry & Sandy Tyra We were first introduced to Filk while in collage when we met Mike Longcor. Our first SF convention was MidAmeriCon. Gerry wanted to do some experiments in acoustics. We considered how to get field experience and EmpireCon (WesterCon 52) became our first gig. Since then we have worked a few cons here and there. We were Interfilk guest at Filk Ontario in 2009. The Microphone Petting Zoo is part of the ongoing science experiments in sound support and acoustics. To pay the bills, Gerry is a Software Engineer (aka code monkey).

Debora VanHeyningen is best known for filking in Zoom circles, with her pet parrot (and occasional backup singer) Basil on her shoulder. She's been a geek her entire life, and a filk fan since 1988, when she walked into a room at ConFusion, to hear Tom Smith singing "Temperature of Revenge". She generally performs a capella, and enjoys both singing filk classics and learning new songs. Once in a blue moon, she'll even write something herself. When not pursuing her various hobbies, she works in a medical research lab at University of Michigan, studying respiratory virus immunology.

The Starlight Darlins are a four-piece band of acclaimed singer-songwriters Lauren Oxford, Emily Johnson-Erday, Gray Buchanan, and Siena Christie. The Darlins formed at Walnut Valley Festival in Winfield, Kansas, in September 2022. Their unique blend of deep friendship, four-part harmony, old-time instrumentation, and stunning original songs altogether creates what can only be described as magic.

Surreptious Whiskey formed during the pandemic as a fun way for a musically-inclined plague pod to pass the time. Members Bill and Brenda Sutton, Kathy Coutinho, and Stephen Hoogerwerf met through the Society for Creative Anachronism, so much of Surreptitious Whiskey's music touches medieval and fantastical themes.




